BOOK TALK


Sitting down at your computer doesn't always feel as invigorating as sitting down at your loom, but computers and looms actually have a lot in common--at least historically.

In a beautiful book titled "Jacquard's Web," James Essigner argues that weaving heralded the computer age. In 1801 a French silk weaver named Joseph Marie Jacquard developed the first algorithmic loom, using a series of thick punch cards to control weaving patterns. This idea eventually developed into Charles Babbage's Analytical Engine and-- a century and a half later—into the IBM computer.

She came to our meeting and announced a give away day at her house the following Saturday. All in attendance were given large garbage bags and were told to take anything they wanted. Rose was also quick to pass along knowledge she had on each fiber; encouraging future towels from her former Cottalin. She smiled broadly and simply said that she expects great things. Boxes of carpet warp are squirreled away for our future

Rep warps. She packed up dyes and assorted stuff she had to work with dyes and handed it over to Jean for Dye Day, and we packed a large bag of skeins so folks had something to dye on. Lots of great color happened that day, but it was all Rose.

She has settled into her new place without loosing one gracious step. She still has looms, and already is working through a new warp. She's helping me through a delicious 8-harness advancing twill she had filed away from years ago that I'm not sure I would attempt without her guidance (357 thread repeat!). To me the greatest part of her gift to all of us is the simple fact that she didn't leave it behind. She laid it out in a potlatch, spreading her wealth around her like a banquet table and inviting us all to share in her feast. I have no doubt we will still see great things from our Rose; and from the gifts of our Rose.
