2020 Conover Workshops Fiberarts Classes

We will be offering our <u>Comprehensive Basic Weaving Class</u> in 2020 four different weeks. Take advantage of a \$40 coupon if you sign up for the February 24-28th or March 16-20th sessions prior to December 31st. We are in the holiday spirit and want to share the good joy! This well-developed curriculum has a great deal to offer experienced and novice weavers alike over a five-day period. The <u>10-shaft Twill</u> 3-day class being offered in April in a monumental undertaking for the Conover elves. We will have four Glimåkra countermarch looms beamed, threaded, tied-on and ready for you to throw the shuttle. The warp consists of 848 ends in 16/2 and 16/1 line linen in half-bleached. The weaver gets to choose from sixty-six different colors offered by Bockens in 16/2 line linen.

<u>Spinning Flax & Hemp</u> is back by popular demand in August. Don't miss out on Susan's enthusiasm for this beautiful fiber. Hopefully the two-days spinning will create a frenzy for you and you won't be able to get enough of this ancient fiber!

Every Autumn we offer our intensive hands-on <u>Learn to Spin on a Treadle Wheel</u> class which meets on a Saturday morning for four consecutive weeks. We use wool as the fiber of choice. This is a great opportunity to see many different wheels in use and we do have rentals available.

A three-day course in <u>Double Width Weave</u> will be offered in October and then again in November. All four Glimåkra 8S countermarch looms will be ready for the weaver to throw the shuttle. Each participant will have a wool throw to take home measuring 57" wide x 53" long off the loom. Enrollment for this class will open up on Monday, June 22nd. A Tip of the Hat, er, Bonnet: A Remembrance

Dear Judy

I know you're dead a long time now so I have no plan to affix postage to this letter. Maybe you occasionally peak back to check in on what you left behind. Maybe not, but it doesn't matter. I'm writing this so others will know the story.

Long ago when I was hardly more than a weaver wanna-be, you saw something in my future. When you knew you were loosing that last battle, you made a point of passing along something to me that you said I would eventually use. We had hardly had time to get to know each other, so you gave it to Jean with instruction to make sure I got it. I don't know how you knew I would need a proper pioneer bonnet, but it turns out that you were right.

Few groups value the weavers and spinners as much as those that focus on the past. Local historical societies live to preserve and explain the way things used to be around here in the early 1800s. Those of us that use the tools they have up for display create a current connection to times long past. Friends involved with such societies have repeatedly invited me to demonstrate my ancient skills during their public events. There is always a thin veneer of pretense that nothing past them has happened yet and they ask me to play along. A long skirt, a simple blouse and an apron is considered close enough for costume, but whatever you cover your body with, your head requires a bonnet. If I didn't already have yours, they'd be quick to loan me one.

No single piece of clothing implies olden times quicker than a "Little House on the Prairie" hat. Back in the day, no proper pioneer lady of any age would venture outside without her bonnet tied neatly under her chin. It not only shades eyes, it can keep burning sun off my whole face and the back of my neck. It baffles and blocks the wind, protecting and preserving both skin and hair style. Having done demos through sun, wind, rain and snow, I can understand why it was what we wore. I doubt it will rise again in fashion, but when everybody around is wearing one, it makes sense and looks a lot less silly.

I can't wear it without thinking of you. I always wonder how many times you wore it to expose others to the wonders of weaving. Maybe you spun at a wheel or worked some other fiber skill while wearing it. I don't know when, how or from where you got it, but I know how it got to me. It may not look like much, but it holds a rich history all it's own that I can personally hand down.

Lace Embellishment 2-day workshop

As weavers we have seen these wonderful lacy units our multi-harness looms cannot create ...now it's time to play at creating lace with the use of pick-up sticks. Students will navigate through the wonderful world of creating open, airy spaces within the interior of their weaving with such techniques as Leno Lace, Brook's Bouquet and more on pre-warped looms. Sara will discuss with students appropriate materials, special tools

and their uses as well as recommended-mended applications for these lovely lacy pieces. (Maximum 15 students)

Students will bring a 4-shaft table or floor loom warped according to Sara's instructions.

Sara is the owner and resident instructor of Red Stone Glen Fiber Arts Center. Dryer Balls

It's been over a year since I bounce away from the oil coated dryer sheets and into balls. Wool balls to be specific. I'm told merino is best. I'm not sure if breed actually matters, but I've come to consider merino the queen of wool, so I won't argue. All natural, chemical free and re-useable, the pure white wool is felted into balls the size of navel oranges. Placed in the dryer, they absorb wet from the wash load and add separation so clothes dry faster. The concept comes to us from the great wool cultures of New Zealand and Australia.

I really like using them, but I had to adapt. First of all they ain't cheap. It turns out that they more than hold their own in the comparative cost ratio, but it can be an investment to start. Then there's the life expectancy mystery. In my culture everything has an expiration date. I had to find peace with vague instructions on how many to use and how long they last. There was no mention at all on how to tell when your dryer balls have gone dead.

The question of how many balls needed seems to be a personal judgment call based on variables of load quantity and material quality. I started with a few and have added more to the dryer drum through the year to settle on 8. I don't always use them all, but a full load of towels needs many.

I expected them to felt into hard little marbles, but with time and use, I noticed some getting soft and squishy. I assume those to be the oldest balls, but I wasn't ready to compost them. It turns out the manufacturer did include instructions on refreshing their balls, and it requires very little hygienic maintenance.

Panty hose is best used to secure multiple balls using a simple overhand knot between each ball. Thin socks (not wool) can be used to tie up each ball individually. Once separated and secured, toss them through a hot soapy wash cycle. They need to be completely saturated, but use as little water as possible to encourage the most agitation. You're re-felting here, so the more you beat your balls the better. Put them through their own hot dryer cycle before you take them out of the socks and your balls are ready to go to work again.

I plan to keep using my wool dryer balls. I suspect they may last for many years, but I will submit an obituary should any pass away from natural causes.
