ON WARPING

At one time, warping became comfortable for me. I don't know exactly when that was but I have used a warping reel from the very beginning. It went smoothly and easily. My arm never became fatigued and I had warps in under an hour, easily. Those beautiful rainbows of threads have inspired me to photograph just the braid for posterity. Today my 50+ year old warping reel is in my husband's workshop getting a renewed finish that will make it lose all the snags and rough places that threatened my smooth warping process. How fabulous it is to have a willing workshop worker to fix, oil, finish, "Jerry-rig" just about anything I can imagine.

I just wish he could "fix" my silk warp!

Study group came up with the wonderful idea to do something we have never done and I thought it is time to use some of the silk yarns I have been collecting, either from yarn sales, yard sales, yarn shop sales or internet sales. I had two cones of luscious celery

green, luminous silk from one of the sales at Jean Jackson's yard and I thought I would surely have plenty for a shawl. I found a lovely 8 harness pattern for a tone on tone, glamorously fringed shawl and got to winding my warp. The reel did its job, I had a glowing braid and I set about putting it on the loom.

This yarn is slippery. This yarn is heavy. This yarn is static. It is fairly fine, I am doing a 27 sett, hard to see. It doesn't hold a knot. In other words, I am in a web of filament every time I near the project. I have no idea if I am going to get it actually on the loom. And then will it stay there? I am in that web when I am asleep, pondering my next step.

So, here are some adjectives I find appropriate for weavers: s..., p..., d..n, c... among others. But I also have these: diligent, conscientious, persistent, patient, hardworking and meticulous. You are all amazing and I admire you all.





Winter Weavings



February has been a great month to weave. January I kinda warmed up by sorting and preparing for a weaving blitz. 4 warps waiting and some finishing of older projects and here is how I began the month.

The little rug/blanket woven to accompany the Navajo children's story was the first. I think of it as a toy. I just imagine using it as we read the story to our 1,3 & 5 year olds. This was a result of the books I wrote about in our last newsletter. So I bought a book on how to weave a Navajo rug and wove one.

The second rather quick project was a set of three towels. We plan a visit to some friends in South Carolina, providing travel is possible. In mid-winter, the sherbet colors of the towels made me think of Carolina Springtime. One of the towels has a cotton boucle weft, the other two made a vibrant plaid woven with the same 6/2 cotton as the warp.

I am on project #3, a silk shawl and am ready to set up the loom for another set of towels (I accidentally bought a lot of mint green 6/2 cotton) for use in my own half bath, again in springy to summery colors. I have some tencel picked out for a scarf for another project and think I will get that done too.

Students will need pre-warped 4-shaft floor looms (no table looms). The workshop will take place at Praxis in person. It will be the responsibility of each participant to make arrangements with Praxis for a loom or floor space for your own loom. Masks required.


